## Sport, Culture, and Society (SPMT 304) Tuesday/Thursday 5:55-7:10 Fall, 2009

### **Course Description:**

This course provides a sociological analysis of sports in American society. Using sociological constructs, this course will critically examine key components of sports and sport-related behaviors as they occur in social and cultural contexts.

## **Course Objectives:**

- Develop an understanding of how sociological theories and perspectives can be used to examine the role that sport plays within American society.
- To examine sports critically and become familiar with the issues that are currently present within American sporting culture.
- To study the recent research findings and theories from the sociology of sport that provide evidence regarding the benefits and drawbacks of sport participation.

### **Case Study Paper Description:**

In a 2-4 page paper, choose a major sports story or major sports broadcast from the newspaper or TV and explore the sociological context and significance of it through some of the themes covered during the course. Paper should use sources from the course or other scholarly literature that reflect on the social aspects of sport. Topic must be approved in advance by instructor by the class before the assignment is due. Papers will be graded in terms of originality of insight, coherence of argument, and how well the literature has been incorporated into the analysis. The best papers will offer a single major thesis statement (or a couple) which the student author will elaborate and support with careful attention to detail and a demonstrable grasp of relevant literature.

### **Extra Credit Opportunity:**

Earn up to ten extra credit points by watching the documentary film "Unforgivable Blackness: The Rise and Fall of Jack Johnson", reading the article "Joe Louis and Jack Johnson" by C.L.R. James (on E-Reserves), and writing a 5-7 page reflection paper on how they relate to issues of race and sport today. Must be turned in by April 29 to receive credit.
