COURSE DESCRIPTION

Application of Kinesiology taping as a treatment technique to promote return to activity and healing. Focuses on taping techniques to aid inflammation reduction, muscle activation and deactivation, and strapping for limiting mobility in treating injuries to the spine, upper lower extremity. Upon course completion, students will earn their Sports Taping Specialist certification.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

At the completion of this course students should be able to complete the following:

- 1. Select Kinesiology Taping techniques for various musculoskeletal conditions;
- 2. Apply Kinesiology Tape for musculoskeletal conditions, to aid inflammation reduction, and encourage muscle activation;
- 3. Identify the indication an contraindications for Kinesiology Taping;
- 4. Demonstrate the components of Kinesology Taping techniques for various body parts; and
- 5. List the historical and evidence based foundation for Kinesiology Taping.

NATURE OF COURSE DELIVERY

Face to face.

ATTENDANCE

Students are expected to be on time, attend all class meetings and be prepared for in class assignments and projects. Excused absences include the following: illness (must bring a receipt or note from a doctor), family death, athletic/academic event(contact instructor in advance), and others at the discretion of the instructor. If there is a concern with exposing areas of the student's body or classmates, it is the student's responsibility to contact the instructor to make appropriate arrangements.
