COURSE DESCRIPTION

Principles and techniques of planning and operating sport facilities. Emphasizes principles and concepts of organization and administration including communication, personnel management, management of physical resources, and risk management. Examines variety of sport operations such as indoor stadiums, athletic field complexes, and managing recreation and intramural activities.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- Discuss the operational structure and management concepts associated within the operation of sport and recreation facilities
- Demonstrate and analyze how risk management is part of the ongoing process of planning and operation of sport and recreation facilities
- Analyze and reflect on current and past global events that changed how sports operation facility management is conducted today
- Observe and critique two events at two different facilities by the use of SWOT analysis, personal observations and other material learned in class
- Utilize the case analysis process to compare the management and operations of different sport and recreation facilities
- Justify an experience through the lens of a productive member of a management team and identify the differences between fans' wants and event personnel needs
- Plan and implement a university-wide event in conjunction with a Mason athletics event

ASSIGNMENT DETAILS

ARTICLE ANALYSIS

This group of assignments is worth 7.5% of the your overall grade.

Purpose: The purpose of this assignment is to read and analyze current and/or past global events that influenced sports facility operations and/or event management. You have been given web-links of the articles and are expected to choose one article from a selection of articles to analyze and reflect upon. You will be encouraged to reference previously learned material in class to find relevant information to help you connect your reflections and analyses.

Paper (2.5%): You will read three articles and prepare a two-page reflection on how the event has or has not impacted the way event and facility operation managers do their work. This paper represents your understanding and analysis through connection of what has been read and discussed in class. Please refer to the rubric on Blackboard to understand how you will be evaluated on this assignment.

A CRITICAL EYE ON FACILITIES

This group of assignments is worth 20% of your overall grade. The first assignment will be worth 8% and the 2^{nd} will be worth 12%.

Purpose: The goal of this assignment is for you to go out to local events to identify and to critique the actions and reactions of each facility to situations as they arise (SWOT). No longer are you going to a game just to observe what happens on the playing field – you must use your recently obtained knowledge to better understand how a facility and event operate. Throughout the semester, you will be required to attend two different events – <u>one event should be sports-related</u>, and the other event should be <u>entertainment-related</u>. At least one event must consist of at least 2,000 patrons or more. You may choose to turn in your assignments in whatever order you like – as long as the two assignments are completed on their respective due dates. Please provide a ticket-stub if one is issued to you.

Paper: You will prepare a four-to-five page paper that includes a SWOT Analysis (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats) of the facility and event that you have attended. You will evaluate all aspects of their experience – from personnel (ushers, security, cleaning crew, concessions, etc.) all the way to parking for the event. The location of security guards, cleanliness of the bathrooms, even the ability to communicate with the staff must be analyzed (among others). Please refer to the rubric on Blackboard to understand how you will be evaluated on this assignment.

HOOPLA REFLECTIONS AND PARTICIPATION

This assignment is worth 20% of your overall grade.

Purpose: The goal of this assignment is for you to obtain practical experience of working an event associated with university athletics. In this exercise, students will plan and execute a small activity in conjunction with HOOPLA, which celebrates the first home game of the men's basketball season. Spirit stations, fun zones, inflatables, food, giveaways, etc. will all be a part HOOPLA. Students will form small committees to plan, budget, implement and manage one small activity during HOOPLA. Class time will be utilized to plan this activity. All students must attend the HOOPLA event on Friday, November 9, 2012, (time is TBD). One class meeting will be cancelled to make up for attending this event.

Paper: You will prepare two, separate reflections on your work with HOOPLA. The first reflection will focus on how you and your group are progressing with your work. The second reflection will be on how you thought the event went. You will do your own SWOT analysis on the event. Each paper must be at least two pages long. Please refer to the rubric on Blackboard to understand how you will be evaluated on this assignment.

RISK MANAGEMENT PRESENTATION

This assessment is worth 10% of the your overall grade.

Purpose: The goal of this assignment is for you to go out into their local community and identify two potential risk management concerns for a local sports/recreation facility. You are strongly encouraged to take pictures of the risks that you identify.

Presentation (10.0%): You must submit highlight the risks that were identified. Each risk must be described in detail, classified on a 1 (not very serious) to 5 (very serious) scale concerning the severity of the risk, as well as the chances an accident could occur. Finally, you should offer a solution for resolving the problem. Pictures should be taken during the assessment and be included in the presentation. You will briefly share with the class the risks that they identified and how you would treat them. A PowerPoint is necessary for the presentation. You will have 10 minutes to present your assessment to the class. Please refer to the rubric on Blackboard to understand how you will be evaluated on this assignment.

CASE LAW REVIEWS

This group of assignments is worth 15% of the your overall grade.

Purpose: The purpose of this assignment is to outline some of the groundbreaking rulings in the sports facility world. The point of understanding case law helps to explain why we do the things we do – and why we have certain policies in place. You will pair with another student (2 in a group) and will choose one of the cases listed below, write a brief summary of the case, and present the case to the class in a 10-minute PowerPoint presentation. If you are not presenting, you are encouraged to take notes on the case and ask questions as there will be a *OUIZ* on all the cases after all the presentations have been completed.

Paper (7.5%): The paper will summarize the case in which you chose to study. The paper must be fourto-five pages. The summary must include the following information: Facts of the Case, Issues of the Case, Findings of the Court and Analysis (Why WE Care!). The paper must include <u>at least 2 scholarly</u> <u>references</u>, which will be cited in APA Style. *Wikipedia is NOT a scholarly reference*. Students will need to provide a **PRINTED** copy of their paper at the beginning of class, on the day of their presentation.

Presentation (5%): The purpose of the presentation is to teach the class the relevant issues and facts of the case. In essence, you will be summarizing your findings for the class. Most importantly, you must answer the question "Why do we care?" for the class. *All PowerPoint presentations are due to your instructor no later than 48 hours before your presentation.*

Quiz (2.5%): After all the presentations have been completed, there will be a 10-15 question (1 per case) quiz testing the knowledge presented by your fellow peers.
