DELIVERY METHOD:

This course will be delivered online using primarily an **asynchronous** format. Course content can be accessed via Blackboard. Students will participate in discussions and activities both as

individuals and in group settings. Students will practice concepts learned in this and previous IOLS courses to create online content for K-12 online and blended students. Interactions with your instructor will occur primarily via email and discussion board activities.

TECHNICAL REQUIREMENTS:

To participate in this course, students will need the following resources:

- High-speed Internet access with a standard up-to-date browser. It is recommended that you download multiple (at least 2) browsers onto your computer (i.e. Google Chrome, Mozilla Firefox, Internet Explorer, and Safari)
- Consistent and reliable access to your GMU email and course content, as these are the official methods of communication for this course
- Students may be asked to create logins and passwords on supplemental websites and/or to download trial software to their computer or tablet as part of the course requirements.

EXPECTATIONS:

- **Course Week:** Because asynchronous courses do not have a "fixed" meeting day, our week will **start** on Thursday at 9:00 am, and **finish** on Wednesday at 11:59 pm.
- **Log-in Frequency**: Students must actively check the course site and their GMU email daily for communications from the instructor.
- **Participation**: Students are expected to actively engage in all course activities throughout the semester, which include viewing all course materials, completing course activities and assignments, and participating in course discussions.

Mastery Learning Approach

In this course we take a mastery learning approach to the assignments. This is how it will work:

- The criteria for completing the assignments will be clearly explained. At times the instructor and students will work together to create the criteria prior to the assignment.
- The instructor will evaluate your work and provide qualitative feedback on your assignments.
- If you have adequately completed all of the criteria you will receive full credit on the assignment.
- If you have not adequately completed all of the criteria, the assignment will be returned and you will be subject to late points until all of the criteria are complete.
- You must complete ALL assignments to get a passing grade.

Late Work

Students are expected to complete and electronically submit all assignments prior to 11:59 p.m. on the last day of the module as indicated on the course calendar. All assignments—EXCEPT for discussion board activities—can be submitted late but a minimum 20% late penalty will be assessed for work submitted after the assignment deadline. Work that is submitted over a week late will receive an additional 20% penalty for each additional week late. No late work is accepted after the final assignment's due date.

Discussion Board Activities—Discussions are an important aspect of this course. Although the discussion prompts will vary, there will be primarily two activity types. First, participants will reflect on their learning and discuss their insights with others in the course. Second, students will participate in peer reviews where they will evaluate others projects and provide critical feedback.

Development Guides—As you identify best practices for creating learning materials using text, images, and video, you will create development guides with dos, don'ts, and examples.

Design Document—Each week you will complete a section of the provided design document template. You will then use that document to develop your instructional unit in EDIT 791.

PROPOSED CLASS SCHEDULE:

Modules	Topics	Activities and Projects Due
Module 1 May 18-24	Introduction to instructional design	Read/view the materials in the module. Create a written reflection focusing on your current design strategies and how they compare to the ADDIE and backwards design models. Complete the analysis section in the design document.
Modules 2 and 3 May 25-31	Standards and Objectives	Read/view the materials in the module. Create a development guide for traditional assessment items. Participate in a discussion board activity on authentic assessments and a VoiceThread on alternative assessments Create standards, objectives, and assessments in your design documents.
Module 4 and 5 June 8-21	Curating and creating content	Read/view the materials in the module. Create a development guide for video lectures and edited videos. Participate in the video brainstorming activity. Complete the content and resources section of the design document.

ASSESSMENT CHECKLISTS:

As explained earlier, the course will use a mastery-based approach to grading. As a result, students will need to complete all of the assignment criteria in order to earn points on the assignment and all assignments must be completed in order to pass the course.

Discussion Board Activities

- 1. Created an original post that fully address the prompt and shows evidence that you've reflected on and applied the content to your current context and/or previous experiences.
- 2. Replied to peers with comments that go beyond praise and confirmation and add something significant to the conversation.

Development Guides

- 1. Identified and communicated best practices for developing the target learning object.
- 2. Provides examples and non-examples that demonstrate best practices.

Design Document

- 1. All of the sections contain sufficient detail that others can easily understand, conceptualize, and apply.
- 2. There is clear alignment between the described learning objectives, assessments, and activities/content.
- 3. The authentic problem used to frame the unit is richly described and clearly connects the learning activities to real world tasks.
- 4. There is a meaningful balance between traditional and performance assessments.
- 5. There is a meaningful balance between curated and created content/resources including at least one image, screencast, and edited video that are created by the student.
- 6. The intended calendar clearly describes learning objectives, assessments, and activities/content for each day.
