Course Description:

Provides students an introduction to leadership theory and practice in planning outdoor adventure activities. Focuses on building skills necessary to engage in a wide range of individual outdoor adventure activities such as orienteering, geocaching, canoeing, rock climbing, and challenge course team building.

Course Delivery Method Lecture/Lab

Learner Objectives:

This course is designed to enable students to do the following:

- 1. Discuss basic leadership theory as it pertains to outdoor adventure activities
- 2. Explain and critically analyze risk management principles for outdoor adventure activities
- 3. Demonstrate and explain the use of a map and compass as a navigational backcountry travel aid while traversing an orienteering course
- 4. Travers a one-mile orienteering course
- 5. Demonstrate appropriate use of the skills associated with the outdoor activities experienced during the semester
- 6. Describe and demonstrate the debriefing process following an outdoor adventure

Required Text:

Rohnke, .K & Bulter, S. (1995). Quicksilver: Adventure Games, Initiative Problems, Trust Activities and a Guide to Effective Leadership.

Evaluation:

Out of a total of 100 points

Attendance on Trips- (20 points-4 points per outing)

For every field experience you attend in its entirety, demonstrating teamwork, leadership, respect for others, the environment, and cooperation, you earn 10 points towards your grade.

Lead/ Facilitate Adventure Activity (10 points)

Based on a class lecture, reading from the text and the field experience students are to lead the class in an adventure activity. Students are to select an activity from the text

Reaction Paper (40 points- 10 points per outing)

Students will be assigned four reaction papers. Each paper should address points discussed in class and a reaction to the adventure activity. Students will receive reaction assignment details for each activity before reaction papers are due. Papers are due normally due before the next class meeting or when assigned.

Final Exam (30 points)

Based on the class lectures, reading assignments and field experiences a 20 multiple-choice exam.
