University Catalog Course Description

Introduces the basics of horseback riding and horsemanship. Emphasis will be on learning how to care for a horse, tack a horse, and basic riding skills such as walking, trotting, and jumping small obstacles

Course Overview

This class requires long pants and a shoe with a 1 inch heel. ASTM/SEI Helmets are also required to be worn and will be available from the barn. Attendance grade is based on both participation and a willingness to help others.

Course Delivery Method

This course will be delivered using a face-to-face format.

Learner Outcomes or Objectives

This course is designed to enable students to do the following:

- 1. Demonstrate proper care of the horse
- 2. Demonstrate proper tacking, grooming and safety around horses
- 3. Present an understanding of the horse's conformation and parts as it pertains to the tack and horse care

- 4. Demonstrate control of the horse both in the walk and trot
- 5. Conduct appropriate behavior around horses to ensure all students safety
- 6. Identify basic parts of the tack as well as basic care of the tack
- 7. Demonstrate how to mount, dismount and adjust stirrups before riding
- 8. Demonstrate a 2-point position at halt, walk and trot
- 9. State basic safety riding principles and ride safely in a group situation
- 10. Classify the horses' gaits by rhythm and beats
