PREREQUISITES:

SPMT 201, 60 hours

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is an examination of sport organizations which focuses on both professional and amateur governance structures and processes. The study of policy in educational, non-profit, professional, and international sport venues is addressed.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

The student will be able to:

- 1. Identify governing bodies in professional and amateur sport
- 2. Recognize policy components and processes in major sport governing bodies
- 3. Recognize the influence of governmental bodies and commissions on sports
- 4. Identify the organizational structure of various sport governing bodies
- 5. Assess the authority and functions of various sport governing bodies
- 6. Identify the membership requirements of various sport governing bodies
- 7. Identify the sanctions and appeal processes utilized by sport governing bodies
- 8. Understand American sport policy and governance in comparative and international context
- 9. Understand different forms of sport policy and governance internationally

COURSE DELIVERY:

Face-to-face in the classroom; one or two classes during the semester may be conducted online.

COURSE OVERVIEW:

The learning experiences in this course are afforded through assignments, class participation, lecture, notes, discussion, group activities and technology assisted activities. Course content includes, but is not limited to, the following: sport in education (intercollegiate, recreation, interscholastic, international); professionalization of sport; organizational communication;

management theories; present status of the sports industry - collegiate, professional, private, manufacturers; governing bodies in professional and amateur sport; organizational structure of a variety of sport governing bodies; authority and functions of various sport governing bodies; requirements for membership in sport governing bodies; sanctions and appeal processes utilized by sport governing bodies; influence of governmental bodies and sports commissions on sport governing bodies; sport policy and governance in international sport.

INSTRUCTOR EXPECTATIONS:

1. All assigned reading for each class is to be completed prior to coming to class.

2. All written assignments must be typed (computer word processing is recommended).

3. Regular attendance and participation is expected. If you miss a class, it is your responsibility to obtain class materials from sources other than the instructor.

4. Students must abide by the Honor Code, guided by the spirit of academic integrity.

5. We will refrain from the use of electronic devices in class during the lecture period, except to follow the power point presentation or take notes.

6. Assignments will be submitted via Blackboard.

7. To pass the course all requirements, including assignments and tests, must be completed adequately and on time.

Class Attendance and Participation:

It enhances your academic success to be in class; therefore, you should attend all scheduled class meetings in accordance with George Mason University policy. In-class participation is important not only to the individual student, but to the class as a whole. We will have fun if everyone is engaged. To be engaged you have to keep up with the reading and be refreshed when you attend class. It is important that everyone arrive on time, in order to help you build good habits for the world of work. Texting in class is **NOT** acceptable behavior; neither is falling asleep.

Note that case analysis is a skill that is unlike the kinds of regurgitative assignments with which you are probably most familiar. There is a lot of material online (both in written and video formats) providing succinct guidelines for analyzing a case. If you are not well skilled in case analysis, you are encouraged to go online to see how best to tackle a case analysis.

Assessment:

- <u>4 Quizzes:</u> Quizzes may include short answer questions, definitions, and essay with some knowledge of organization abbreviations necessary: @10% each = 40%
- <u>4 Case Analyses</u>: In addition to the quiz, there is a detailed case study which students must analyze based on guidelines provided by the instructor: @10% each = 40%
- <u>Comparative Sport Policy Research Paper</u>: Working in pairs, students will select a country and investigate sport governance/policy related information as well as research that country's sports history, economy and form of government. Students will present a written paper, and will give a 10-12 minute synopsis as a presentation.

Written Paper = 9%

Presentation = 6%

<u>Multi-group synthesis</u>: Following the presentations, students will work together in class to identify key similarities and differences having to do with the varied sport systems presented: 5%.
